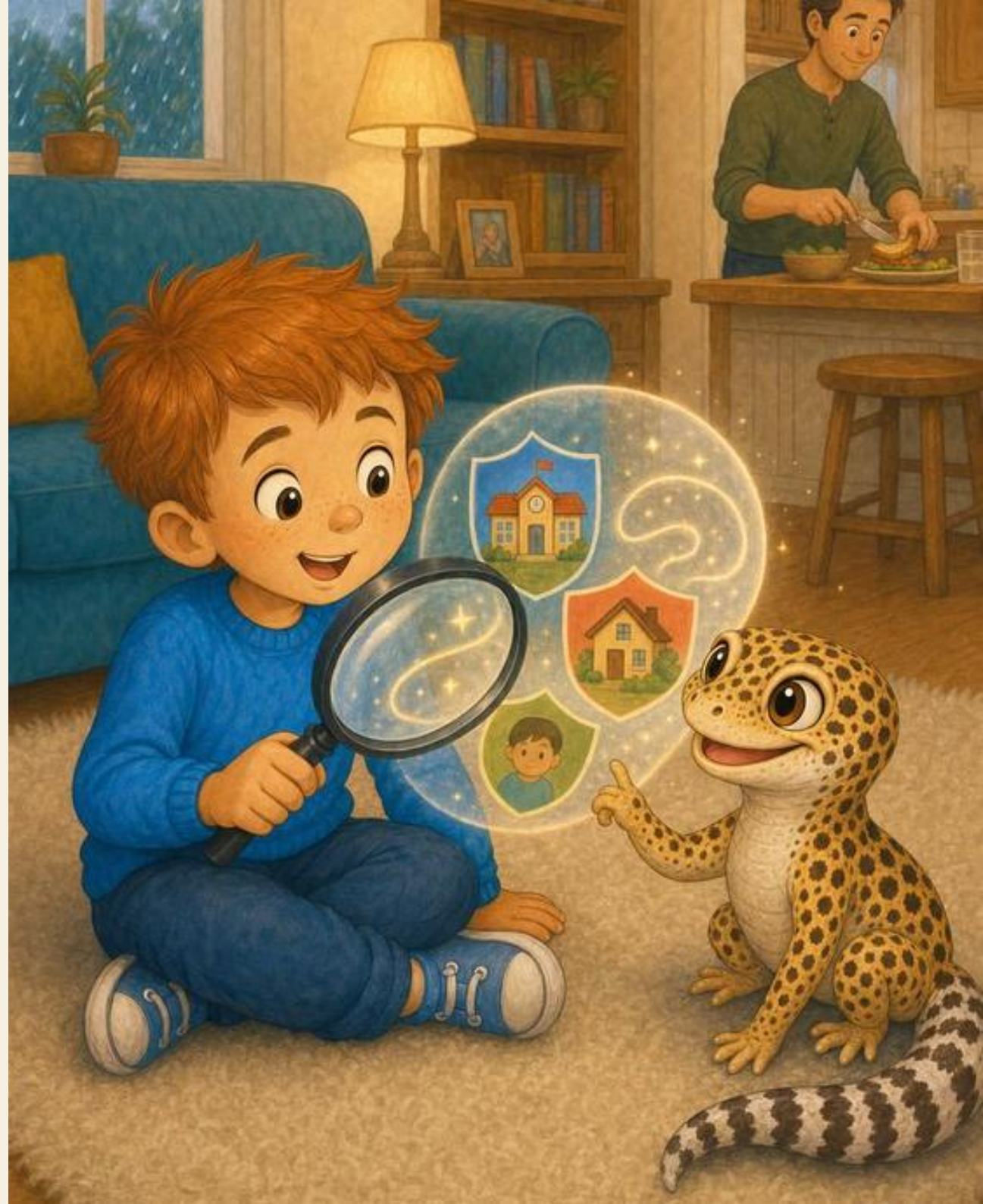


JB'S BRIGHT BUTTON ADVENTURES

Leo and the Mystery Message

STOP. BLOCK. TELL.

A read-together story for approximately ages 4 to 6





A question in the game

Leo raced a bright green dinosaur around Dino Dash while Dad made lunch nearby. A player called MegaMystery99 sent a message: Which school do you go to? Leo knew the answer and almost typed it.

FOR GROWN-UPS

Keep chat-enabled play in a shared space. Check whether the game lets you limit messages to approved friends or turn chat off for younger children.



Private clues stay private

JB put on his detective hat. Your name, school, home, town and where you are right now are private clues, he said. Friendly players do not need those clues to race dinosaurs. Leo took his hands away from the keyboard.

FOR GROWN-UPS

Teach a few concrete examples of personal information. A child does not owe anyone an answer, even when the question sounds friendly.



Stop, block and tell

Leo did not reply. He called Dad over and showed him the message. Dad thanked Leo for stopping. Together they saved the message, blocked the account and used the game's report button. JB awarded Leo a bright detective badge.

FOR GROWN-UPS

Practise the block and report controls before they are needed. A calm response helps the child keep bringing questions to you.



Fun without the mystery

What if the player was nice? Leo asked. Dad explained that a game name cannot prove who someone is. Leo returned to a family-only race and kept his private clues safely tucked away. JB still lost, but claimed his tail slowed him down.

FOR GROWN-UPS

The aim is not to frighten children about every unknown player. It is to give them a simple response when identity is uncertain and personal questions appear.



YOUR BRIGHT BUTTON

REMEMBER

Do not answer personal questions in a game. Stop, block the contact and tell a trusted grown-up.

TALK ABOUT IT

- Which clues about you should stay private?
- What could you do if a friendly player asked where you live?

TRY IT TOGETHER

Name three private clues, then find the block and report controls in one game your child uses.

PARENT SETUP

- Use the child's real age and the strongest suitable privacy setting.
- Limit chat and friend requests to people the child genuinely knows where possible.
- Agree that personal questions are always brought to a trusted adult.
